

DETOX COMMITTEE

I have been a Vancouver detox Client 3 times. The 1st time I lasted 2 days. I hated it and left and went straight to the liquor store. The 2nd time, about 6 months later, in a drunken haze, I rolled down the embankment from 2nd avenue into the Vancouver Detox parking lot. I had separated my shoulder (not sure when) and was in extreme pain and calling for an ambulance. Two detox workers dragged me in. I stayed for a week, my longest term of sobriety for decades.

I had my first taste of AA. The panels that came in were an awakening. It was the people in the panels that really turned on a light switch. The stories they told were my stories, yet they were laughing, they were friends, they were happy. These were elements that had disappeared from my life. I look back now and realize that I longed for what they had.

The 3rd time, after another year or so of trying to control my drinking, I had reached the point of wanting to die ...or get sober. I was able to listen to what was said at the Detox panel meetings. Willing enough to do anything and honest enough to admit that I was indeed an alcoholic. I left Vancouver Detox after 5 days for what I hope is the last time as a client but not as a volunteer. I went straight to a sponsor and did every-thing he suggested and now nearing 3 years if sobriety. I am honoured to be one of those panel members I long ago admired, carrying the message of AA to the front lines.

About a month ago I had a particularly rewarding experience while delivering literature to Vancouver Detox. A client had just got off the phone with Central Office - he was looking for a big book. The Detox worker who just let me in, looked at him and said, "ask this fellow." I was able to reach into my bag and hand him a Big Book seconds after he had phoned to request one. That was rewarding.....and a little spooky!

I invite anyone who would like to participate in this rewarding 12th step work of carrying the message of AA into Detox facilities to check out the Detox subcommittee. We meet the 2nd Saturday of every month at 10 am at Central Office. There is opportunity to do committee work, panels, bridging the gap work, and delivering literature. MORE INTERGROUP CORNER

My name is Doug G., and I am an alcoholic. I also am honoured to be serving as your Operating Committee chair for this year.

I hear members saying that they have no idea what Intergroup is, or what Intergroup is doing. At a recent workshop on the Future of the Phones, I heard people saying that they had no idea how desperate the phone situation was, and suggesting that Intergroup should be working harder to communicate what is happening to the groups.

Tradition Five: Each group has but one primary purpose—to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers. This is the reason the AA group exists. From AA Guidelines – Central or Intergroup Offices

A central or intergroup office is an A.A. service office that involves partnership among groups in a community — just as A.A. groups themselves are partnerships of individuals. A central/intergroup office is established to carry out certain functions common to all the groups — functions which are best handled by a centralized office — and it is usually maintained, supervised, and supported by these groups in their general interest. It exists to aid the groups in their common purpose of carrying the A.A. message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

In the Lower Mainland, for this purpose, The Greater Vancouver Intergroup Society (Intergroup) was founded for the purpose of facilitating the 12 Step work that is the lifeblood of the AA Group. With hundreds of AA groups, how would alcoholics find a meeting if it were not for a central office to keep our meeting listings, print directories and web page? If a drunk wanted to connect with AA, what number would they phone if we did not have a central office phone number with volunteers waiting to answer the phone? Central office plays a vital function in each group's 12 Step work. Intergroup is responsible for this office and our 12 step activities in the region.

There are three types of voting representatives at Intergroup;

Your Group's Intergroup Representative

The Intergroup representative is the voice and vote for your group. Sending a well-informed representative ensures that your group is well represented by Intergroup. Your intergroup representative will be making decisions that affect AA here, and will be voting on an annual budget exceeding \$300,000.00, so this is a position of responsibility and your representative should be chosen accordingly. Your elected representative should be reporting back to your group on the work of Intergroup. If you are unaware of what Intergroup is doing, or if you have questions or issues with what is happening, sending a strong intergroup representative that can speak for your group and report back to your group is the best solution.

• It is suggested that the Intergroup representative be elected by their group to a one-year term from date of election.

• For this position, it is suggested the member have at least one year of sobriety.

The Outreach Subcommittee Chairperson

To coordinate the 12 Step work AA groups are doing in the region and the public face of our fellowship, Intergroup has selected to organize Outreach Subcommittees. These include;

- Accessibility Committee
- Cooperation With The Professional Community Committee (CPC)
- Correction Facilities Committee
- Detox Committee
- Hospital Committee
- Public Information Committee (PI)
- Telephone Committee
- Treatment Facilities Committee

Each subcommittee has an elected chairperson. The Subcommittee Chairperson is the voice and vote of the subcommittee members at Intergroup. If you are elected to chair a subcommittee you are responsible to further the mandate of your subcommittee, working with Intergroup and the Operating Committee to carry the AA message from our groups into the appropriate facilities and communities.

- For this position, it is suggested the person have no less than one year of sobriety.
- This person will also serve as an active member of the Intergroup Committee with a vote and a voice.

In coming months we will elaborate on each of these subcommittees.

The Operating Committee members

The Operating Committee members are the legal directors of the Greater Vancouver Intergroup Society. The Committee consists of nine elected members of Alcoholics Anonymous including three officers: Chair, 1st & 2nd Vice Chairs, plus the office manager. The Operating Committee is responsible to ensure the day-to-day needs of the fellowship are met by paying the bills, hiring the staff and carrying out the requests of Intergroup.

• It is suggested the member have at least two years of sobriety and preferably having served one full term on the Intergroup Committee.

• If you have served, past or present, as a Greater Vancouver Intergroup Representative or outreach subcommittee chair, you are encouraged to put your name forward as a member of the Operating Committee.

Into Action

How effectively AA in the Lower Mainland reaches out to the suffering alcoholic depends on how active and involved our Intergroup members are. Achieving our primary purpose depends on healthy participation. If you are not currently involved in service, or it is time to rotate, why not consider becoming a part of the 12th step work in the region and get involved in Intergroup? If your group's intergroup representative is not reporting back to your business meetings, start asking questions and encouraging their active involvement. If your group hosts a detox panel, or a hospital or treatment facility meeting, or has a regular phone shift, make sure that you have a representative at the monthly subcommittee meeting so that your voice is heard, and communication is healthy between your group and Intergroup.
